### **Maybe In Your Lifetime. People Will Live On The Moon - And Even Mars!**

ASA is plotting to build houses on the moon by moon dust, it can create a subdivision in space. Half a century ago, the astronauts of Apollo 17 spent three days on that pockmarked orb, whose

gravitational pull tugs not just on our oceans but our imaginations. The astronauts moonwalked in their spacesuits and rode in a lunar rover, with humanity watching on television sets 240,000 miles away.

cans will have their first subdivision in space. Living on Mars isn't far behind. Some say NASA's timeline is overly ambitious.. But NASA scientists all said that a 2040 goal for lunar structures is attainable.

The U.S. space agency will blast a 3-D printer up to the moon and then build structures, layer by

2040. With 3-D printing and soil made out of NASA is now plotting a return. This time, the stay will be long-term. NASA is going to build houses on the moon — ones that can be used not just by astronauts but ordinary civilians. By 2040, Ameri-

layer, out of a specialized lunar concrete created from the rock chips, mineral fragments and dust that sits on the moon's cratered surface and billows in poisonous clouds whenever disturbed.

ICON is calling its plan Project Olympus. It's an in situ resource utilization construction system, meaning it would make use of materials found on other planets.

NASA is more open to partnering with academics and industry leaders, which has made the playing field much wider.

#### **Turning A Problem Into A Solution**

Among the many obstacles of taking up residence on the moon is the dust — fine powder so abrasive it can cut like glass. It swirls in noxious plumes and is toxic when inhaled.

But four years ago, Raymond Clinton Jr., senior technical adviser of the science and technology office at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., sketched the idea of houses, roads and landing pads. Dr. Clinton realized 3-D printing could be a solution.

If homes on Earth could be successfully 3-D printed from soil made from the minerals found here, homes on the moon could be printed from the soil up there, where temperatures can swing up to 600 degrees and radiation and micrometeorites pose a risk to buildings and bodies.

NASA is calling its return to the moon Artemis. Artemis I, the first of five planned moon missions, blasted off from Kennedy Space Center with only robots on board, circled the moon and returned safely to Earth. Artemis II, which will carry four human crew members on a 10-day flight around the same path is scheduled for November 2024. That mission

will be followed up one year later by Artemis III, when humans will land on the lunar surface.

So far, the plans for houses on the moon are little more than renderings, but architects at firms like SEArch+ (Space Exploration Architecture) have drawn up concepts.

#### 'No Home Depot Up There'

NASA has partnered with ICON, a construction technology company, to reach its 2040 goal. ICON first received funding from NASA in 2020, and in 2022, it announced an additional \$60 million for a space-based construction system that can be used beyond earth to print everything from rocket landing pads to habitats, all with concrete mixed on site. So far, the plans are little more than renderings, but they've enlisted the input of architects at both the Bjarke Ingels Group and SEArch+ (Space Exploration Architecture) to draw up concepts and designs.

Nearly any object can be printed in 3-D, and the process has been touted as a quick, cost-efficient solution. 3-D printing builds objects layer by layer from a digital file; in its construction projects on Earth, ICON uses a proprietary building material called Lavacrete.

The company is the creator of the Vulcan robotic large-scale construction system, which has been used to build some of the first 3-D printed homes. But printing in deep space is another dimension.

Traveling light is critical, he said, because every additional kilogram of weight carried on a rocket to the moon costs about \$1,000,000. Carrying materials from earth to build in space is unsustainable.

#### 'First Thing' and Furniture

Any equipment that goes to the moon needs to be tested on earth to ensure it can withstand the environment. And before NASA can build homes. NASA needs to build landing pads, so that when the rockets carrying the 3-D printers land on the moon, the dust spread that kicks up can be mitigated.

NASA scientists are currently working to perfect a simulated lunar concrete. Scientists are running tests on spheres of simulated moon dust that has been poured and cast into a small cylinder. When held up to a plasma torch, they can withstand temperatures of 3,400 degrees Fahrenheit. Of course, a house is made of more than walls - even in space, humans need a door to enter and exit, and once inside, they need objects on which to sit and sleep, and all the other accoutrements of life. NASA is working to create prototypes for space furniture and interior design.

Prime Real Estate Is Really on Mars

NASA's vision is for a space-based lunar construction system called Olympus, controlled on earth by technicians skilled in the field of space construction. Scientists at NASA say it is too early to consider the value of homes on the moon, or even how an ownership structure could look. But the moon presents a cache of untapped resources.

# Priscilla

reamily gazing at the album covers of Elvis Presley was not, statistically speaking, a rare habit among American teen girls in the late 1950s and early '60s.

But for Priscilla Beaulieu, teenage fantasy became a strange and surreal reality. Sofia Coppola's "Priscilla," starring Cailee Spaeny, captures all the dreaminess, the absurdity and, finally, the nightmare of falling in love with Elvis.

Priscilla was just 14 years-old — a 9th grader - when she first met him. It was 1959. She was living in West Germany, where her Air Force officer stepfather was stationed. The swoony early scenes of Coppola's film find a solitary Priscilla sipping soda in a Navy base diner while a cover of Frankie Avalon's "Venus" ("Venus, make her fair / A lovely girl with sunlight in her hair") plays around her.

A man approaches and asks if she likes Elvis. Of course she does. Would she like to meet him? Um, what? After some negotiations with her parents, Priscilla is sitting there on the sofa at a small party when the King of Rock 'n' Roll, himself (Jacob Elordi), strolls down the stairs. Big, big sigh.

Coppola, the writer-director of "The Virgin Suicides," "Lost in Translation" and "Somewhere," has always been innately attuned to the

forming identities, swelling desires and intimate revelations of young women. In the story of Priscilla Presley (the film is based on her 1985 memoir, "Elvis and Me"), Coppola has found a tale tailor-made for her delicately perceptive style of filmmaking.

As a movie, "Priscilla" is the diametric opposite of Baz Luhrmann's "Elvis." Where Luhrmann's film was lurid and careening, Coppola's is muted and textured. Her film is a kind of fairy tale that turns claustrophobic and cautionary.

"Priscilla" is, at least at first, quite funny. After Priscilla initially catches Elvis' eye at

that party, she's back at school learning about the food groups. How could anyone possibly stomach that? Or when, after Elvis hasn't called following his stint in the military, Priscilla's mother asks her if there aren't any boys in school she might be interested in, instead. Priscilla doesn't need to say anything; just the image of lining up your average 9th grade boy against Elvis Presley is enough.

Yet their courtship continues in somewhat traditional fashion. Elvis, played with relaxed magnetism by Elordi ("The Kissing Booth," "Saltburn"), is drawn to Priscilla because she reminds him of home; it's clear her purity is part of her appeal to him. It's a long time before they

have sex, though her youth remains tacitly problematic. "Wow, she's young," says one woman watching Elvis lead Priscilla upstairs. "Like a little girl."

Their life together is initially sweet if deranged. Priscilla drifts through a dream world even if Elvis' extremes are glaring to us. His bedroom in Graceland

with the question of what it truly means to be human.

Paul draws the short straw for holdover duty - i.e. babysitting the students staying on campus during the break for various reasons. After a few days of chaos and humor, the group is whittled down to just one: Angus

> Tully (newcomer Dominic Sessa), whose mom abandoned their plans for a beach vacation at the last minute to spend time with her new husband. And no one is happy, least of all Mary Lamb (Da'Vine Joy Randolph), the head cook mourning her son's death in Vietnam.

The actors get to explore depths beyond the tropes of the cranky teacher, the depressed cook and the privileged jerk as they clumsily try to navigate an unpleasant situation. To

make matters even bleaker, food deliveries stop over the break and the heat is turned off everywhere but the infirmary, where they must bunk in sad hospital beds for the duration.

It's strange to think that this is the first

is comically gaudy. "I got this for you," we hear Elvis say kindly, before a handgun is handed over.

No Presley songs play in "Priscilla." (While Priscilla Presley is an executive producer, the Elvis estate didn't participate in the film.) But it does share a telling track ( Carl Orff's "Gassenhauer") with Terence Malick's "Badlands," another movie about an underage teen girl (Sissy Spacek) who throws her life in with a charismatic drifter with matinee-idol looks (Martin Sheen).

And like they do for Holly in "Badlands," things turn increasingly dark for Priscilla. Elvis treats her like a doll he keeps at home while he goes in and out. "It's either me or a career, baby," he tells her. Coppola, who dedicates the movie to her mother, Eleanor Coppola, has long specialized in gilded cages ("Marie Antoinette," "The Bling Ring"). Graceland turns out to be a prison to Priscilla.

There aren't many false notes in Coppola's layered film, shot by Philippe Le Sourd, with sumptuous production design from Tamara Deverell and fine, toned-down costumes by Stacey Battat.

But "Priscilla" fades where "Elvis" found its footing. When Presley's downturn accelerates in Las Vegas, Luhrmann's movie swelled with tragedy. In the same time period here, Priscilla awakens. Yet it feels underdeveloped, coming too quickly, in a sudden rush - albeit a terrific rush, with Dolly Parton playing.

in "Sideways," which came out 20 years ago. These two together make for a special match. Giamatti doesn't let the characters' quirks (a glass eye) overwhelm his choices - this man's pathos runs deep, as does his militant view of what a Barton man does and does not do.

Randolph also adds turbulent emotion to what could have been a tertiary, one-note character consumed in grief. She is in grief, which comes on in both expected and unexpected ways, but she's also witty and wise and a perfect foil to Paul's didactics.

But the true discovery is Sessa, making his film debut. They found him in the drama department at one of their shooting locations, Deerfield Academy. Casting modern teens in period pieces can be a tricky, but Sessa looks straight out of 1969. And he goes head-to-head with his seasoned co-stars, exhibiting a real capacity for both drama and physical comedy.

The idea of found family is a little too neat and cliche for "The Holdovers," but perhaps more resonant and believable are the hard, and sometimes comically, learned lessons about how to be a decent person in the world — how to look outside of your own problems to empathize with and even help others. No one comes out of this fixed or healed; It's just a bit of life mixed up in the surreal pressure cooker of the holidays.

### **'Energy Follows Thought'**

Willie Nelson Looks Back On Seven Decades
Of Songwriting In New Book

illie starts with the words. It's one of the surprising revelations in Willie Nelson 's new book, "Energy Follows Thought: The Stories Behind My Songs" an examination of the 90-year-old country legend and soon-to-be Rock & Roll Hall of Famer 's seven decades of songwriting.

He has always started the writing process by thinking up words rather than strumming chords. He does not, however, write those words down, not even on a napkin.

"I have a theory," he said, "that if you can't remember 'em, it probably wasn't that good."

Nelson actually started out as a poet of sorts. At age 6 in Depression-era Texas, he composed a verse in response to the looks he got when he picked his nose and got a nosebleed while standing in front of his church.

"My poem was, 'What are you looking at



me for? I ain't got nothin to say, if you don't like the looks of me, look some other way," he recalled 84 years later. "That was the beginning."

He started writing songs soon after.

When he became a superstar in the mid-1970s, Nelson would be best known for his dynamic live performances and his guitar and vocal stylings. But as a young man in the 1950s and early '60s, he was known as one of the

struggling songsmiths who spent their days and nights at Tootsie's Orchid Lounge in Nashville.

In 1961, three of his songs became hits for other artists: Billy Walker's "Funny How Time Slips Away," Faron Young's "Hello Walls" and, most importantly, Patsy Cline's "Crazy".

He would go on to make other writers'



songs his own in the same way. He didn't write most of the biggest hits associated with him.

He almost seemed to retire from songwriting when fame finally came, enjoying the chance to record his favorite old standards or compositions of hot young writers.

But he never stopped composing. Director Sydney Pollack prodded him to write a new song for the 1980 Nelson-starring film "Honeysuckle Rose". Nelson responded by writing "On The Road Again."

Pollack was less than thrilled with the lyrics. But was pleased when he heard the chugging music. And Nelson would appreciate the nudge.

"Without knowing or trying, in a few little lines, I'd written the story of my life," he says. But the songs did get fewer and farther between. Songwriting can be a young man's game. "I don't write as much as I used to," he said.

He did write the song that gives the name to his book, "Energy Follows Thought" for his 2022 album, "A Beautiful Time."

In it, Nelson and co-authors David Ritz and Mickey Raphael give brief backstories to 160 different songs he's written.

The year of his 90th birthday has been overloaded. He was feted by a fellow stars, including Neil Young and Snoop Dogg at the Hollywood Bowl. And now he'll be inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame.

#### A BIONIC LIMB?

This Brain Controlled Robotic Arm Can Twist, Grasp and Feel

athan Copeland was 18 years old when he was paralyzed by a car accident. A team at the University of Pittsburgh needed to test whether a person could learn to control a robotic arm by thinking about it. The idea is that small electrodes implanted in the brain can read electrical activity and write data.

Copeland underwent surgery in which doctors tacked lentil-sized electrode arrays onto his motor cortex and somatosensory cortex. These would read the electrical patterns of his brain activity, showing his intentions to move his wrist and fingers. Through something called a brain-computer interface (BCI), these impulses would be translated to control a robotic limb that sat atop a vertical stand beside him in the lab.

The team reported that Copeland could feel whatever the robotic hand touched—experiencing the sensation in his own fingers. Over the past few years, he had learned to control the hand with his

thoughts while watching what it was doing. But once the researchers gave him touch feedback, he doubled his speed at performing tasks.

Touch is important for restoring mobility, because to take maximum advantage of future BCI prosthetics or BCI-stimulated limbs a user would need

real-time tactile feedback from whatever their hand (or the robotic hand) is manipulating. The way prosthetics work now, people can shortcut around a lack of touch by seeing whether stuff is being gripped by the robotic fingers, but eyeballing is less helpful when

the object is slippery, moving, or just out of sight.

The brain is bidirectional: It takes information in while also sending signals out to the rest of the body, telling it to act.

Because Copeland's brain hadn't been injured in his accident, it could still—in theory—manage this dialog of inputs and outputs.

But most of the electrical messages from the nerves in his body weren't reaching the brain. The Pittsburgh team wanted to engineer a workaround. They believed that a paralyzed person's brain could both stimulate a robotic arm and be stimulated by electrical signals from it, ultimately interpreting that stimulation as the feeling of being touched on their own hand. The challenge was making it feel natural. The robotic wrist

should twist when Copeland intended it to twist; the hand should close when he intended to grab; and when the robotic pinkie touched a hard object, Copeland should feel it in his own pinkie. Of the four micro-electrode arrays implanted in

Copeland's brain, two grids read movement intentions from his motor cortex to command the robotic arm, and two grids stimulate his sensory system. From the start, the research team knew that they could use the BCI to create tactile sensation for Copeland simply by delivering electrical current to those electrodes—no actual touching or robotics required.

Researchers took advantage that Copeland retains some sensation in his right thumb, index, and middle fingers. The researchers rubbed a Q-tip there while he sat in a magnetic brain scanner, and they found which contours of the brain correspond to those fingers. The researchers then decoded his intentions to move by recording brain activity.

Once they had established that Copeland could experience sensations, and that the researchers knew which brain areas to stimulate, the next step was to get Copeland used to controlling the robot arm.

Human fingers sense pressure, and the electrical signals zip from the hand to the brain. The team mirrored that sequence by putting sensors on the robotic fingertips.

Think of a robotic finger as a lever with a hinge on just one end where it connects to the robot's palm. Electrical signals from that torque sensor flash to the BCI, which then stimulates the implanted brain electrode linked to Copeland's corresponding finger.

So when the robot's index finger grazed a block, Copeland felt a gentle tap on his own index finger. When he gripped a hard block, the resistance gave him a stronger sensation. Routing this sense of touch directly to Copeland's hand meant for the first time, he could feel his way through.

Producing sensory signals like this is a major win. It suggests that we can begin to at least approach full mimicry of natural and intact movements.





It's that time of year where those seasonal ingredients come into play in traditional holiday drinks, cocktails and wines

The holidays not only mean buying and wrapping gifts, meeting up with long lost relatives, and spreading holiday cheer, but it means enjoying holiday-themed food and drink! Have you ever wondered where your grandma's infamous eggnog began? The story behind it?

Well, you probably have. If grandma or grandpa hasn't told you the story behind some of your favorite festive holiday drinks this might answer some of your questions.

Mulled Wine:

There are many variations and recipes for mulled wine and depending on where you

are in the world, different names for this drink! Here are some of the biggies:

Mulled wine uses red wine and sometimes port wine and spices such as cinnamon and clove. In addition, you may find a few orange peels for added flavor and decoration. The Swedish version adds sugar, rum, and brandy.

It's rooted back to Scandinavia and can be found not only there, but across Europe and in America today as well. You'll often find Americans drinking the Holiday Glogg at Christmas markets or at Kindlmarkt's around the country, celebrating German roots and heritage.

To prepare Holiday Glogg, it's heated and simmered over a medium-low heat for about 15 minutes, until sugar is dissolved but before the mixture begins to boil.



Gluhwein:

Gluhwein is traditionally red wine seasoned with spices, sometimes raisins, and served warm. According to Culture Trip, it began in Germany when the wine was heated using red-hot irons. One of the oldest appearances of gluhwein in German history dates back to 1420 when a nobleman sipped the sweet and spicy beverage.

Eggnog

This drink is made from eggs, sugar, milk or cream, and sometimes liquor. There is much debate on eggnog's origins.

According to the Oxford English Dictionary, it was "a kind of strong beer brewed in East Anglia" in 1693. However, many people claim that the term "eggnog" is an Americanism from the 1700s. Miriam Webster says it was first used in 1775.

There's also speculation that the term eggnog was created from the practice of rapidly pouring the mixture between two pitchers to mix it thus creating eggnog or the British term, "egg flip."

Just like mulled wine, eggnog recipes vary greatly regionally (we could do a whole article JUST on eggnog).

The Dutch version of eggnog, Advocaat is actually served with whipped cream, cocoa, and a spoon. Advocaat combines brandy or cognac with sugar, vanilla, and egg yolks.

#### FLATTERING PHOTO **FILTERS ARE DRIVING YOUNG** PEOPLE TOWARDS **ESTHETIC TREATMENTS**

cience and esthetics joined of forces with phone cameras and have caused a beauty revolution like that not seen since makeup became popular with the start of motion pictures. Especially with the young December 2022 claimed that over half people who use them the most, photo and video-editing filters have made them want to attain the filtered versions of themselves in real life.

With Tiktok's Bold Glamour "filter," introduced earlier this year, face editing in videos looks so realistic that it's almost undetectable. Many users have commented that after seeing how they look when the filter is on, they're more dissatisfied with their unfiltered face than they were before. 90% of women admit they edit photos of themselves before posting them online. Many of them admit that they retouch every photo of themselves that they post.

Facebook released research findings from a survey of 22,000 users showing that 32% of teen girls felt unattractive when comparing themselves to people they saw on Instagram. A survey found that 45% of young females say that

social media makes them want to get cosmetic surgery.

75% of plastic surgeons saw a spike in clients under 30, according to data released last week (2023) by the American Academy of Facial Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, The American Society of Plastic Surgeons reports that in 2020, some 12,000 cosmetic Botox injections were carried out on teenagers.

# It Must Be Him By Contributing Writer A Genderful Musical Memoir

Skylight Theatre Company presents Michael Kearns' sixteenth solo show, It Must Be Him: A Genderful Musical Memoir, extending the show's run with a matinee performance at Skylight Theatre. Delicately placed within the expansive LGBTQI+ experience, the show follows a tradition of expression that provokes, reveals, and questions, while capturing the zeitgeist of Kearns' generation.

It Must Be Him extends Kearns' unerring commitment to self-discovery with a unique voice defined by hope, reality, desire, tragedy, and promise. It is the first time that he has melded music into his solo performance. Kearns' latest memoir is directed by Shelton with piano accompaniment by Leigh Anne Gillespie.

The show will make stops in other Southern California locales and beyond. The next scheduled performance is at Pasadena's Lineage Performing Arts Center on Sunday, December 10. Additional performance dates will be announced soon.

"We didn't have a Sam Smith," Kearns reflected, "so we changed the pronouns, substituted male names for female ones or—if you dared—sang the song straight. The songs of longing and brokenheartedness provided a soundtrack for the hidden feelings that were waiting to come out; the exterior theatricality of Judy, Dusty or Barbra mirrored the interior emotional life of our secretive awakenings. But what It Must Be Him posits is that the stance many young gay men of my generation adopted has followed us into adulthood."

It Must Be Him: A Genderful Musical Memoir resonates with Kearns' sensibility. Reacting to the tragic AIDS crisis, Kearns wrote and performed



intimacies, presented by Highways on its opening weekend, in which he played a panoply of characters rarely depicted in the media in 1989.

Michael Kearns has woven his work as an artist and social activist into the fabric of Los Angeles (and beyond). It would be impossible to chronicle the theatre scene in Los Angeles, the AIDS crisis that shocked Hollywood, homophobia, the artistic response to homelessness in L.A., and the teaching of underserved populations without mentioning his name. You've heard of ice hockey and field hockey, but what about underwater hockey? This sport is a six versus six, without goaltenders, and takes place in a pool. The sport utilizes a weighted puck at the bottom of the pool. Players use a small one-handed stick to push the puck toward the goal. Players wear fins for mobility, masks to see underwater, and thick latex gloves to protect the hands from the pool bottom. You may assume that they wear oxygen tanks to breathe underwater-but you would be wrong. Instead, players have to hold their breath underwater and periodically return to the surface to breathe. This gives the sport an interesting team aspect, as players have to anticipate when a teammate or opposing puck-carrier is going to return to the surface.

**Canal Jumping** 

Canal jumping is popular in the Netherlands and takes place at a location with a muddy canal. Players jump as far as possible from one side of the canal to the other without getting wet and muddy. In the canal there is a pole with a flat round bottom that swing when weight is applied. The pole is typically 12.5 meters long. Contestants get a running start before jumping onto the pole. As the pole is swinging toward the other side of the canal, contestants try to climb as high as they can before dismounting safely to the other side. Ear Pull

Ear pull is an Inuit game entirely about endurance. Competitors face each other with their legs connected. A string about two feet long is looped around the ears of both contestants. The contestants pull until one contestant gives in to the pain and the string becomes separated from their ear.

**Death Diving** Death diving is a Norwegian diving sport that sees belly flops and people landing on their backs. In death diving, contestants jump from a board about 10 meters high and attempt to hold a pose for as long as possible before entering the water in a tucked position. People get creative and perform flips and other tricks. Bossaball

Bossaball combines volleyball with soccer, gymnastics, and capoeira. The sport is played on an inflatable court with a net There is a trampoline on either side. Teams get five touches to get the ball over the net. There are scoring zones, with points awarded when the ball is scored in the opponent's trampoline.







A store in Swansea, Wales, that supports the Barnardo children's charity has circulated a request to its donors, United Press International reported on Oct. 27: Please don't send us your sex toys. "Please be mindful that we are a children's charity and as such we have a range of ages on our wonderful volunteer team," the statement read. "We therefore ask that you refrain from donating your used and unused marital aids! ... The branch has CCTV so that these items can be traced back to their owners." In other words, we know who you are.

Desirae Kelly of Farmington, Missouri, woke up at 5 a.m. on Oct. 24 to a strange feeling. "I actually felt something move in my ear," Kelly said in a TikTok video. Fox News reported that Kelly was in such discomfort, she started to cry in the waiting room at urgent care. As a nurse started to flush her ear with water, Kelly "felt whatever that was crawl out of my ear ... and I watched out of the corner of my eye something fall and land on my sweater," Kelly said. "I watch this black spider with all eight legs crawl across the floor." She said she screeched and threw up as the nurses trapped the spider in a container. "The nurses were so sweet and passed no judgment like I thought they would," Kelly said. "I don't think I could ever sleep without earplugs again."

A 75-year-old woman in Pavia, Italy, had to get the courts involved to get her two sons, ages 42 and 40, out of her house, CNN reported on Oct. 27. Mom described her sons as "parasites" who had been living with her without contributing financially, even though both had jobs. Judge Simona Caterbi called the brothers "bamboccioni," or big babies, and declared they have until Dec. 18 to vacate the woman's home. "Once a certain age has been exceeded, the child can no longer expect the parents to continue the maintenance obligation within limits that are no longer reasonable," Caterbi said. The brothers hadn't decided whether they would appeal the decision.

Mesa Public Schools said in a statement that the investigation is ongoing.

"He was yelling." The owners, however, said they weren't going to "comment on a policy we've had for years. We just want to live in the woods and cook."

How Teens Learn Differently Than Adults

cientists have uncovered a unique feature of the adolescent brain that enriches teens' ability to learn and form memories: the coordinated activity of two distinct brain regions. This observation, which stands in contrast to the adult brain, may be related to teens' off-derided affinity for reward-seeking behavior. These findings suggest that such behavior is not necessarily detrimental, but instead may be a critical feature of adolescence.

"Studies of the adolescent brain often focus on the negative effects of teens' reward-seeking behavior. However, this tendency may be tied to better learning," said Daphna Shohamy, PhD. "Using a combination of learning tasks and brain imaging in teens and adults, we identified patterns of brain activity."



What we can take from these results isn't that teens have better memory, but the way they remember is different. This study involved 41 teens and 31 adults, focused on a brain region called the striatum. Previous research showed that the striatum coordinates many aspects of higher brain function.

"Reinforcement learning is making a guess, being told whether you're right or wrong, and using that information to make a better guess next time," said Juliet Davidow, PhD.

Imagine you are given a series of cards with numbers on them and are asked to guess the next number:

"If you guess right, the striatum shows activity that

corresponds to that positive feedback, thus reinforcing your choice," Dr. Davidow explained.

Because of teens' inclination toward reward-seeking behavior, the researchers proposed that this age group would outpace adults in terms of reinforcement learning.

When comparing the brains of teens to those of adults, there is no difference in reward-related striatal activity between the two groups. The difference between adults and teens lay not in the striatum but in a nearby region: the hippocampus.

The hippocampus is the brain's memory headquarters. It is not typically related to reinforce-


ment learning. But in this study, the authors' fMRI analysis revealed an uptick in hippocampal activity for teens — but not adults — during reinforcement learning. Moreover, that activity seemed to be tightly coordinated with activity in the striatum.

Researchers slipped in random and irrelevant pictures of objects into the learning tasks, such as a globe or a pencil. The images — which had no bearing on whether the participants guessed right or wrong — served as a kind of background noise. When asked later on, both adults and teens remembered seeing some of the objects, but not others. However, only in the teens was the memory of the objects associated with reinforcement learning.

What we can take from these results isn't that teens necessarily have better memory, in general, but rather the way in which they remember is different.

Indeed, studies have shown that adolescence is a pivotal time when powerful memories are formed, which the authors argue could be due to this enhanced connectivity between the hippocampus and striatum.

Broadly speaking, adolescence is a time when teens begin to develop their independence. What more could a brain need to do during this period than jump into learning overdrive? It may be that the uniqueness of the teen brain may drive not only how they learn, but how they use information to prime themselves for adulthood.

### CONCEPTS IN LEARNING: The Challeges and Development of Teaching Young Students to Read

earning to read is a complex process involving skills and knowledge.

In an English alphabetic system, the individual letters on the page are abstract and meaningless, in and of themselves. They must eventually be linked to equally abstract sounds called phonemes, blended together and pronounced as words.

To learn to read English, the child must figure out the relationship between sounds and letters. Thus, the beginning reader must learn the connections between the approximately 44 sounds of spoken English (the phonemes), and the 26 letters of the alphabet.

What research has taught is that in order for a beginning reader to learn how to connect or translate printed symbols into sound, the reader must understand that speech can be segmented or broken into small sounds (phoneme awareness) and that the segmented units of speech can be represented by printed forms (phonics). This understanding that written spellings represent phonemes of spoken words is necessary for development of reading skills.

If children cannot perceive the sounds in spoken words – for example, if they cannot "hear" the at sound in fat and cat and perceive that the difference lies in the first sound, they will have difficulty decoding or "sounding out" words.

This awareness of the sound structure of our language seems so easy that we take it for granted. But many children do not develop phoneme awareness.

We have strong evidence that it is not the ear that understands that a spoken word like cat is divided into three sounds and that these discrete sounds can be linked to the letters C-A-T.

Rather, we know it is the language systems in the brain that



performs this function. In many children that skill is only learned with difficulty, and thus must be taught directly, explicitly, and by a well-prepared and informed teacher.

It also has become clear that the development of these critical early reading-related skills are fostered when children are read to at home during the preschool years, when they learn their letter and number names, and when they are introduced at very early ages to concepts of print and literacy activities.

Does this mean that children who have a difficulty understanding that spoken words are composed of discrete individual sounds that can be linked to letters suffer from brain dysfunction or damage? Not at all. It simply means that the neura systems that perceive the phonemes in our language are less efficient in these children.

The develoment of phoneme awareness, the development of an understanding of the alphabetic principle, and the translation of these skills to the application of phonics in reading and spelling words are non-negotiable beginning reading skills that all children must master.

But the development of phoneme awareness and phonics are not sufficient for learning to read the English language so that meaning can be derived from print. In addition to learning how to "sound out" new and/or unfamiliar words, the beginning reader must eventually become proficient in reading at a fast pace larger units of

print such as syllable patterns, meaningful roots, suffixes, and whole words.

#### The Development Of Reading Fluency

While the ability to read accurately is a necessary skill, the speed at which this is done becomes a critical factor in ensuring children understand what they read.

Children vary in the amount of practice that is required for fluency in reading to occur. Some youngsters can read a word only once to recognize it again; others need 20 or more exposures. The average child needs between four and 14 exposures to automatize the recognition of a new word.

Therefore, it is vital that children read a large amount of text at their independent reading level and that the text provide specific practice in skills being learned.

It is also important that spelling instruction fosters the development of reading fluency. Through spelling, youngsters receive many examples of how letters represent the sounds of speech and also alert the young reader to the fact that written words are made up of larger units of print. This insight lets the developing reader know that word recognition can be accomplished by reading words in larger "chunks" rather than letter-by-letter.

#### **Constructing From Print**

The ultimate goal of reading instruction is to enable children to understand what they read.

The ability to understand what is read is based on several factors. Children who comprehend well, seem to be able to activate their relevant background knowledgwhen reading – that is, they can relate what is on the page to what they already know.

Good comprehenders also must have good vocabularies, since it is difficult to understand something you can not define. They also have a knack for summarizing, predicting, and clarifying what they have read. Good comprehenders are also facile in employing the sentence structure within the text.

If they can read the words on a page accurately and fluently, they will be able to construct meaning at two levels. At the first level, literal understanding is achieved. The children must guide themselves through text by asking questions like, "Why am I reading this and how does this information relate to my reasons for doing so?," "What is the author's point of view?," "Is the text consistent?," and so on. It is this second level of comprehension that leads to reflective, purposeful understanding.


