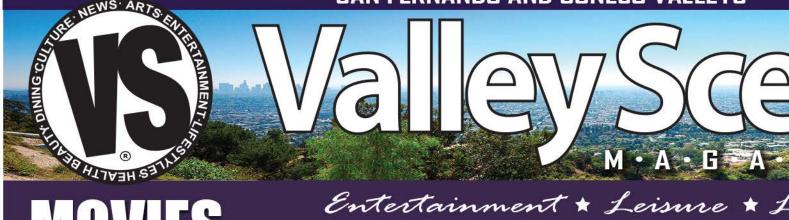

Hit the Slopes

Of course we have snow! SoCal has everything. For beginners to double-black diamond showoffs, snow boarders, and all snow lovers, our San Bernardino Mountains make it an easy peasy two-hour drive. Mountain High Resort (https://www.mthigh.com/) is the closest, 90 minutes from LA, with 290 skiable acres at 8,200 feet for a true alpine experience. Choose among 59 trails - the longest is 1.6 miles – (Mountain High boasts SoCal's longest runs). Three terrain areas welcome families, beginners, intermediate and advanced skiers. The West Resort is open nightly from 5 to 10 p.m. in peak season. Enjoy lunch at Grand View Lodge, 8,200 feet up. Also "Yeti's Snow Play" area for kids of all ages with tubing, sledding and snow play. There's also snow biking. Season passes: \$499, adults; \$449, ages 13-22; \$349, ages 12 and under. Estimated season is December 3 to April 16, 2023.

Snow Valley Mountain Resort (https://snow-valley.com/) is both family friendly and Double Black Diamond challenging, two hours from LA – and night skiing on Fridays and Saturdays in peak season. Some 240 skiable acres, served by

14 lifts, include lots of beginners' slopes like "Thunder Mountain," a favorite with Hollywood movie-makers, and the Children's Learning Center, with dedicated beginners' slopes and lifts. Intermediate skiers enjoy SoCal's longest intermediate runs up to 1.25 miles. Advanced skiers swoosh above the tree line in the "Slide Peak" area on Black Diamond and ultra-steep Double Black Diamond runs. Anytime Snow Pass: \$359, adults; \$299, ages 13-21; \$199, ages 6-12; \$299, ages 65-69, and well-deserved

Skiing in Palm Springs? You bet! Ride the Palm Springs Arial Tramway (https://p-stramway.com/cross-country-skiing/) two-and-a-half miles up 8,516 feet to Mt.

season is December 25 to April 9, 2023.

\$25 Super Senior, ages 70 and up! Estimated

San Jacinto State Park. Rent skis, boots and poles (\$21, adults; \$14, children) at the Activity Center, and off you go! Cross country skiing on some 50 miles of snowy terrain. Estimated season is January and February.



If you've got the time – Mammoth Mountain Ski Area (https://www.mammothmountain.com/) is a straight-shot, five-hour drive to the largest ski resort in the Western U.S.! All the accommodations, bars, restaurants, shops – and ski and snowboard runs – you need. More than 3,500 skiable acres, with 175 ski runs – the longest is three miles! Seven snowboarder parks with three halfpipes, 100-plus jibs and some 50 jumps; 28 lifts and three gondolas. From the beginner bunny slopes to Double Black

Diamond runs like "Climax" atop California's highest lift-served summit. Cross country skiing, of course. Pass options include \$269, 2-day adult; \$369, 3-day adult, and \$499, 4-day adult. Estimated season is November 11 to May 29, 2023.

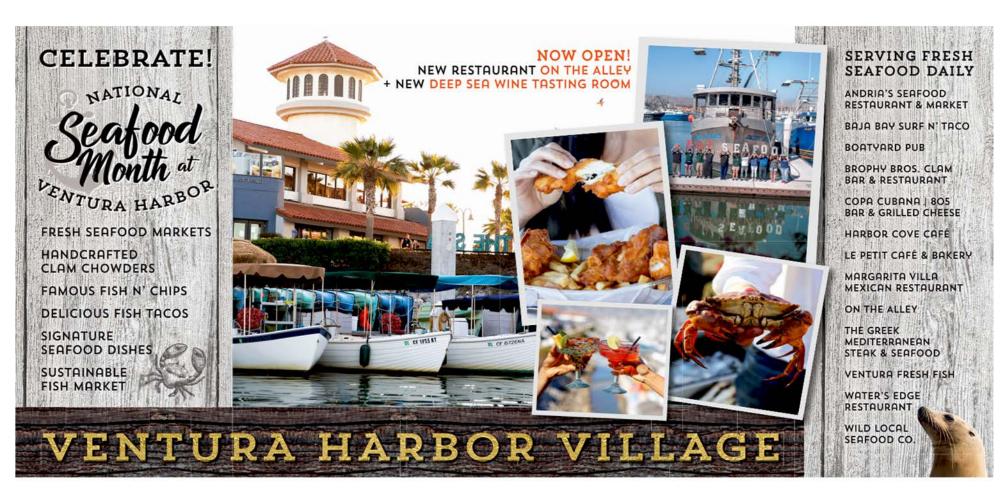
Make Mine Ice!

It's back!! Glide into winter at the Holiday Ice Rink Pershing Square (https://holidayicerinkdowntownla.com/) in DTLA. Festivities kick off with "Ice Breaker: The Opening Celebration," featuring special performances and live entertainment

on opening day, November 23 continuing to January1, 2023. Open daily including Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. Hours vary, but generally run from 11:30 a.m. – to 9:30 p.m. Skating sessions are 60 minutes. \$20

Ice skate by the sea! Check the site for updates. Best yet, go all out and spend a frosty weekend in San Diego, at the Hotel Del Coronado's (https://hoteldel.com/) famed "Skating by the Sea" ice rink, November 17 through January 1, 2023. Open daily, generally weekdays 4 - 10 p.m. and weekends 11 a.m. - 10 p.m. \$40 general admission. \$35 hotel guests. Reserve the rink-side Frostbite Lounge, with plush seating, fire pits and holiday drinks and bites. Book the "Skating by the Sea" package including overnight accommodations and two daily rink passes.

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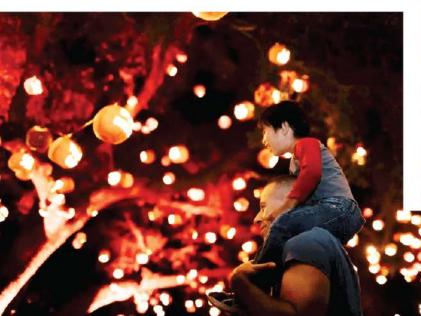

DON'T WORRY DARLING

omewhere around when TikTok videos were analyzing, with the intensity of the Zapruder film, whether spit flew at the Venice Film Festival premiere of Olivia Wilde's "Don't Worry Darling," it became clear that the melodrama of the movie's promotional tour had easily eclipsed the movie, itself.

The tabloid frenzy that engulfed "Don't Worry Darling" was so public, so out in the open that it quickly passed into something kind of exhausting. I would definitely rather re-watch "Don't Worry Darling" the movie than replay that media storm. But in some ways, the on-screen and off-screen dramas go hand-in-hand. Like that fraught Venice debut, Wilde's movie, set in a Palm Springs fantasy world, brings together beautiful faces in a sunny, fashionable locale with the possibility of sinister doings afoot.

"Don't Worry Darling," which opens in theaters Friday, takes a kind of "Stepford Wives" or "Truman Show" concept and reorients it with a potent #MeToo lens. All the ingredients are here for a powerful dystopic drama: Wilde, an ascendant filmmaker coming

off her terrific debut, the 2019 teen comedy "Booksmart"; Florence Pugh, one of the most electric young actors working in film today; Harry Style's pop presence; and some sensational mid-century modern production design thanks to Richard Neutra's Kaufmann Desert House.

Yet for all its promise, "Don't Worry Darling" at every twist and turn lacks the right balance of suspense. Wilde, working from a script by Katie Silberman, conjures a kind of '50s-style utopia in which the young married couple Alice (Pugh) and Jack Kramden (Styles) live on a picturesque cul-de-sac. Every morning the devoted housewives kiss their suit-clad husbands goodbye before they drive off to a mysterious dirt mountain in the desert to do whatever keeps this strange male fantasy humming.

At least since Shirley Jackson's "The Lottery," marrying routine and ritual with ominous cracks in a social facade has been a fine foundation for conspiratorial thrillers of all kinds, from "The Twilight Zone" to "Get Out." And though it's a compelling starting framework for "Don't Worry Darling," every little revelation is bluntly



over-the-top, sapping the movie of any mystery. The town is named Victory and its only Black resident is a traumatized woman (KiKi Layne) who shouts "Why are we here?" before quickly being disappeared. No more subtle is the town's cult-like leader, Frank (Chris Pine, smoothly devious), preaching about keeping "chaos" at bay.

But it's still easy enough to go along with the film because, well, Pugh. If her devotion to the film has been uncertain during its release, Pugh's commitment to the role is far harder to question. It's often riveting following her increasingly paranoid psychology as Alice's growing suspicions cause her to doubt everything, maybe even her own seemingly perfect husband.

For a while, "Don't Worry Darling" seems to be an almost perfect Hollywood embodiment

of the King Princess song, "1950." ("I like it when we play 1950.") Pugh and Styles have a glamorous chemistry together, even if their codified gender roles — Alice greets him at the end of the day at the front door with a cocktail in hand — are increasingly dubious. Style's performance, along with his in the upcoming "My Policeman," hint at real possibility for him as a movie star of cryptic allure.

"Don't Worry Darling" is ultimately neither worthy of all the off-screen fuss nor quite the on-screen disappointment it's been made out to be. It's a promising but clunky thriller that feels to me like it's mistaken two acts for three, overly drawing out the portentous set-up and leaving off the story, after its big twist ending, just as it's getting interesting.

CATHERINE CALLED BIRDY

assion projects can go all sorts of wrong ways, but Lena Dunham has made something of a triumph in "Catherine Called Birdy," a medieval coming-of-age story.

The film is based on a book she discovered at age 10. She found a kind of comfort and coziness in Karen Cushman's Newbery Honor-winning novel about a spirited 14-year-old living in the year 1290 in the English countryside. There is nothing quite like historical fiction to light up the imagination of a young girl. As Dunham got older, she found herself relating to more than just Lady Catherine — she empathized with the mother, the nurse, the friend and the older widow. Her adaptation, which she wrote and directed, manages to encompass all of that.

Catherine, or Birdy, is a classic heroine brought beautifully to life by Bella Ramsey, a talented young actor. We're introduced to Birdy in the waning days of her privileged adolescence, living with her family, her mother Lady Aislinn (Billie Piper), her father Lord Rollo (Andrew Scott), her brother Robert (Dean-Charles Chapman) and her

nurse Morwenna (Lesley Sharp) at Stonebridge Manor where the only riches this once great family seems to have left is the value of their titles. She longs to fight in the crusades like her Uncle George (Joe Alwyn) or be a monk like her other brother —basically anything but being a wife and mother.

Much to her horror, she'll discover that her father's plan to save them from financial ruin is to marry her off, leading to some amusing montages of the ways she attempts to sabotage the matches. The film lures you into this anachronistic world with a soundtrack of 1990s cover songs. Dunham's script, and her actors, are up to the task of melding the old and the new without resorting to inserting Instagram-speak.

There's nothing new in a story about a young lady, be it in the 13th or 21st century, being asked by society to live a life that she doesn't want, but Dunham is wise enough to not make the looming marriage be the only thing. This is a film that is much more concerned with family, friendship and the heartbreak of growing up. The emotion of it all sneaks up on you. It lures you



in with comedy, wit and irreverence and before you know it, you're reaching for the tissues.

It is maybe the best thing that Dunham has done and makes me excited for what's to come.

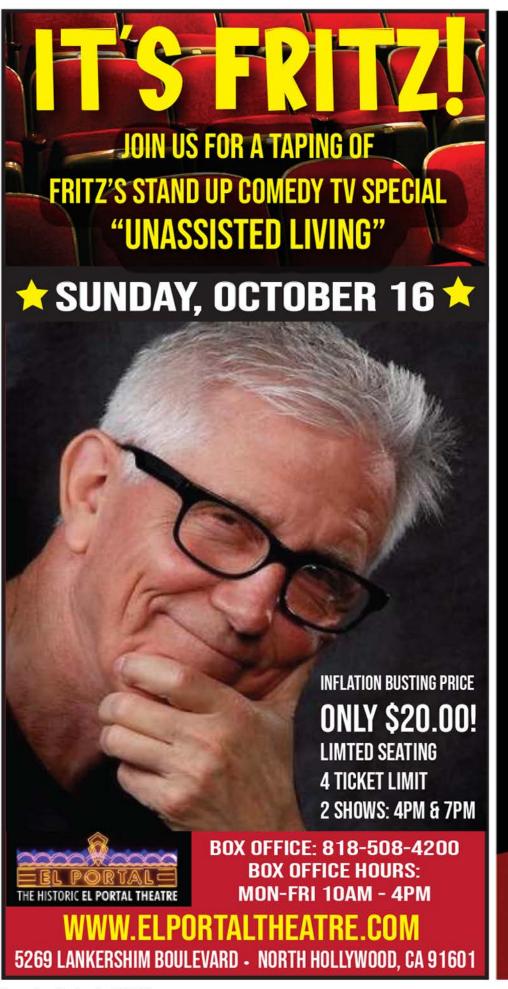

hat is the largest organ of the human body? The skin, and it weighs approximately 15% of our total body weight. Learning more about your skin's particularities is highly important.

The skin is an organ because it consists of tissues and cells of different and specific functions. Seventy two hours after he was born, Michael Sokenu was wheeled to the operating room for surgery, the first of many that he would have during the first few years of his life.

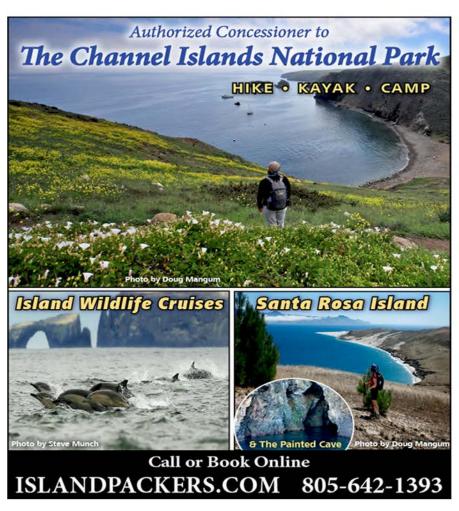

Although progressive resistance and cardio training by themselves have been found to be very efficient forms of exercise, scientists now know that performing both of these types



of exercise is the best bet for success. If you combine both progressive resistance and cardio training, you will increase the strength of your muscle groups and increase overall endurance. According to a recent scientific study, exercisers who used both cardio and progressive resistance during a two month time period lost 45 percent more weight than exercisers who did cardio training or progressive resistance alone.

Just as important as the type of exercise you perform is, the way in For this group of people, the motivawhich you exercise is also important. It probably will be unsurprising that being consistent is the name of the game. Exercising inconsistently may strain your muscles and will probably

not aid you to build strength and endurance. In addition, it is unlikely to improve your whole-body health. According to most scientists, the best regime is to exercise for forty minutes to an hour three to five times per week.

Unfortunately, it turns out that for a significantly sized subset of the population, getting sufficient exercise is not as easy as attending the health club a few times every week or listening to what scientists claim. tion to exercise is the primary issue - this group of people simply doesn't have the motivation to go to the gym. Actually, they might resist any and all exercise, to the point of severe anxiety.

Nobody knows what percentage of the population suffers from problems with the motivation to exercise, but scientists say that up to 20 to 40 percent of people claim that they "hate" or "dread" exercise. An even larger percentage of people might have more mild problems with the motivation to exercise, finding that even though it is simple enough to commit themselves to an exercise regime for a week or two, motivation eventually degrades, leaving them where they were initially - unhealthy and heavy.

If you are one of these people who struggles with the motivation to exercise, the good news is that there are some easy strategies to deal with the struggle. In a recent research study, volunteers who needed to start an exercise program were provided with a brief learning program that aided them to decide on the right kinds of exercise, were provided with a therapist who specialized in exercise motivation, and were given a brief course in hypnosis. After six months, they were asked to evaluate their progress. It turns out that over 85 percent of the participants had adhered to an exercise program throughout the whole six months. Even better, they generally lost an average of fifteen more pounds than the control group.

If you have an interest in this study, it might make sense to look into locating a motivational therapist, habit control therapist, or therapist who deals with hypnotherapy. These therapists are provided with special training in helping people to transcend anxieties, build the motivation to exercise, and reinforce the creation of good habits. One more choice for exercise motivation is self-hypnosis - which is a simple and inexpensive process that often helps people take control of their own inborn abilities to be motivated.

Hypnotherapy and self-hypnosis are risk-free ways of increasing motivation that have been proven to provide success in the case of exercise motivation. Hypnosis works by using hypnotic relaxation to enhance the powers of the unconscious mind to influence the modification of behavior and habit development. Hypnotherapy is a good choice for the exercise adverse because it can help increase the drive to get trim and lose weight easily and effectively.

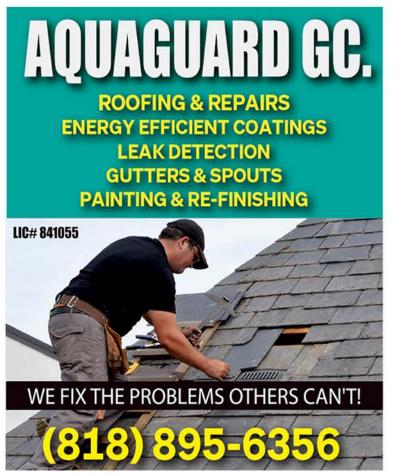
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"I'm Not Single, I Have a Dog: Dating Tales from the Bark Side"

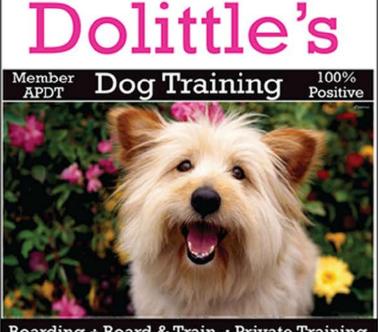

The crew radioed that they "had a subject that partially matched the description ... but his backpack was upside down so it was the wrong color," explained the group's Anna Debattiste. "The pilot said, 'He's saying hi, he doesn't seem to be in distress,' so they left," she added. In fact, it was the missing hunter, and in a classic case of blame-the-victim, Debattiste said he "should have" waved aggressively with both arms overhead, or waved "a brightly colored piece of clothing." Thankfully, the crew went back and retrieved the man, who was cold and dehydrated but otherwise unharmed.

-- Toby Cohen and Jonathan Neman booked a rental home in the Hamptons for two weeks beginning on Aug. 22, to the tune of \$10,000. On Sept. 15, they filed a lawsuit, saying the home, owned by Agnese Melbarde and Edouard Gass, was "uninhabitable." Why? Because the thermostat had been set to "a minimum temperature of 70 degrees Fahrenheit and then locked," The Daily Beast reported. The plaintiffs and their families, who wanted the A/C set at 68 degrees, were "forced to endure continuous discomfort for the duration" of their holiday, which ruined it for them. When they complained to the owners, they said, they were told to "suck it up and deal." Neman and Cohen also allege that workers showed up to spray "toxic chemicals" in the backyard during their stay, which forced them to stay inside for several hours. The suit asks for a full refund.

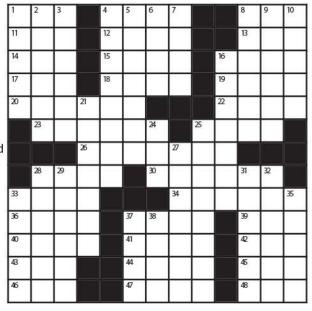

Boost Your Children's Self-Esteem This School Year

hile packing bags and backpacks for school, there's one essential that may be overlooked: Children's self-esteem. Although many children may feel confident and self-assured at home, they can feel differently in the classroom. When children have high self-esteem, they're less likely to reflect negative feelings toward others.



"If children can treat themselves kindly, they'll treat others that way," said Carter Peters from KinderCare Learning Centers' education team. "When children feel encouraged, supported and loved, they are able to give those feelings to others."

Consider these three tips to boost your children's self-esteem.

Be Your Children's Cheerleader

When praising or complimenting children for their achievements, be specific and include affirmation for positive character traits, such as "You were so kind to help Ms. Delmar take her recycling out" or "I'm proud of you for seeing she needed help and offering it." Being specific with your compliments reinforces the idea that your children are kind and helpful. Eventually, they'll offer others the same positive affirmations and be less likely to look to outside influences to define their sense of self.

"When children have high self-esteem and self-worth, they know when someone's opinion of them is untrue," Peters said. "Children with high self-esteem become adults capable of believing in themselves."

Give Children Space to Safely Express Their Emotions

While it's important to intentionally connect with your children one-on-one, it's equally important to give them space to come to you for help. Let them know you notice when they don't seem like themselves but try not to push them to share before they're ready.

You can talk with your children about the ways they can communicate with you, aside from one-on-one conversations. If they find it easier to communicate their feelings through writing, you can go to the store together to pick out a journal. Children who are not yet proficient writers may prefer to draw pictures about their feelings. No matter the method, be sure to make time to check in with your children.



Teach Emotional Literacy and Replacement Skill Behavior

You can help your children move beyond comprehension of basic emotions – happy, sad, mad – and toward an understanding of more nuanced emotions. When children can identify their feelings, they're closer to developing healthy responses.

Commonly labeled "bad behaviors" are often young children's way of communicating something is wrong, so they may need help identifying the emotion driving their actions. It's important for children to understand that while their feelings are acceptable, their behavior may not be. That's where replacement skills – acceptable ways to express emotions – come in. For example, try saying "It's OK to be mad. It's not OK to hit other people. When you're mad, you can hit a pillow."

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HOW TO TEACH EARTHQUAKE

arthquakes are an ever-present danger. At times predictable and at times unexpected, earthquakes can cause massive damage and pose safety risks. It's essential to know the proper protocol to maximize your safety. This is especially true if you are a parent, as you are in charge of teaching children what to do when an earthquake strikes.

Familarizing Yourself With Earthquake

Perhaps the most important step in teaching your children earthquake safety is first becoming proficient yourself.

An earthquake is a natural disaster caused by the movement of earth's tectonic plates at areas called faults. The center of an earthquake is called the epicenter. Earthquakes can range in severity.

Staying safe during an earthquake involves understanding the risks that earthquakes present. If you are indoors during an earthquake, it's important to drop to the ground, cover yourself by getting under a table or desk, put your arms over your head, and hold on to a secured object until the earthquake is over. This is called "drop, cover, and hold on." If you are outdoors, seek open area away from buildings. It's also important to assemble an emergency kit, create a building evacuation plan, and stay informed via regional apps or websites.

Prepare Properly

Before teaching children what to do, make sure to establish safe places in your home to go to should an earthquake strike, such as large, heavy tables or interior walls away from windows and bookshelves. It's also important to create an evacuation plan to facilitate fast and organized evacuation through the nearest exit. You'll also want to assemble an emergency preparedness kit with first aid materials such as bandages, antiseptic, a flashlight, a small supply of food and water, and an emergency cell phone. Consider taking a

basic first aid or CPR & AED course to learn the ins and outs of administering emergency aid ahead of time.

You'll want to make sure to have avenues of communication open. This starts by finding a place to get the most up-to-date earthquake alerts. We recommend getting the USGS's Earthquake Notification Service on your phone for by-the-minute earthquake updates. You'll also want to keep your local contact information current so you can notify neighbors, associates, and family of your location.

What To Do When An Earthquake Strikes

Find an open area. Move to find an open area free of anything that could fall on top

If you're in a vehicle, stop driving. Driving during an earthquake is a recipe for disaster especially if you are in heavy traffic. Slow down as quickly as possible, make sure your seatbelt is fastened, and stop until the earthquake is over. Be sure to stop in an area with open sky above you. Once the earthquake has concluded, proceed cautiously and avoid streets, bridges, and ramps that show damage.

Drop, Cover, and Hold On. First, drop to the ground; next, take cover by getting under a table, desk, or alternate piece of furniture and putting your arms over your head; finally, hold on to the table, desk, or piece of furniture until the earthquake stops. If you cannot find any furniture, crouch in an inside corner of the room and cover your head with your arms. Move away from buildings, utility wires, glass, or anything that could fall.

If you happen to get stuck under debris, cover your mouth with your arms or your shirt to avoid contaminating your airways. Tap on a nearby pipe or wall to alert rescuers to your location.

Talk To Your Children

Take the time to sit down with your kids and explain what earthquakes are. Use visual aids and simple slogans like "drop, cover, and hold on" to convey safety tips clearly. Once you've done the educating, it's time to start practicing.

Practice Drills

Routinely practicing earthquake drills will familiarize children with what do in the event of an earthquake and will help reduce panic should one strike. Important concepts to cover include where to go (under desks, or near inside wall corners), what to do and where to move in the event of an evacuation Practice each of these steps by running through them as though an earthquake were actually occurring. Cover each of the steps





discussed in the sections above, and be sure to answer any questions your kids might have. If you are a parent, make sure your child's school is routinely practicing earthquake drills with official evacuation plans to ensure that your child and his or her peers are safe.

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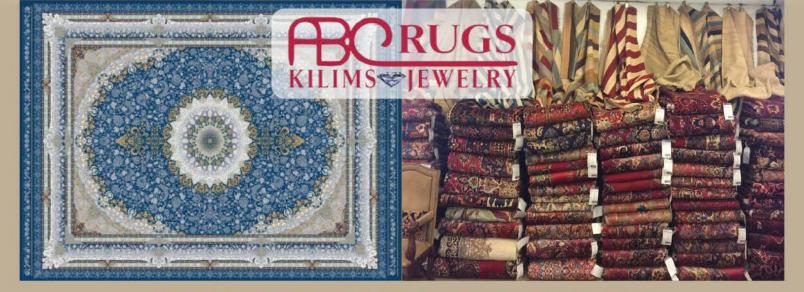
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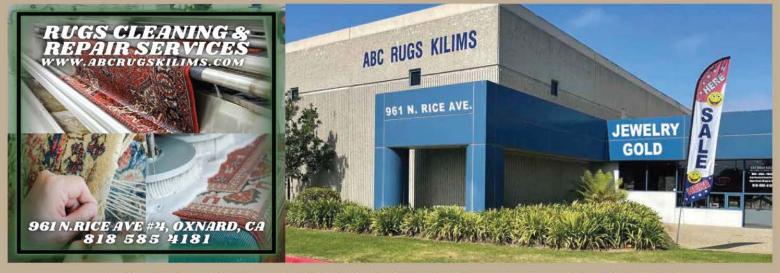
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
